As I meet and talk with the Club Presidents in our District I am impressed with how we all focus on doing the best we can. In that process of improving many of us "should" on ourselves and others. This tiny word interferes with our ability to improve.

Most of the time our "shoulds" come from a fantasy that perfection is possible. Should is criticism and causes anxiety. Should gets in the way of problem solving because instead of allowing us to start from a place of strength, we start from a place of a place of not good enough. Think about how different things would be if you felt like you were already pretty great and that there were things you could do better in the future.

I am here to tell everyone that you are pretty great for no other reason than you all want to let go of the fantasy of being perfect and just put one foot in front of the other on the path of improvement.

Presidents have asked that the District provide them with useful ideas, strategies and tools to help their Club grow and improve. In response to that request beginning in October there will be a monthly article in the Key on aspects of Robert's Rules and how they can be used to help meetings run more smoothly.

Robert's can provide the structure. Realizing the goal of effective meetings will also take an effort to agree not to "should" on each other when perfection does not happen. We can all support improvement by:

- Noticing when we use the word "should".
- Questioning why someone thinks we should do that thing.
- Questioning if the "should" helps us feel good.
- Questioning if "should-ing" has helped us achieve our goals or actually lead to the opposite.
- Trying the sentence again, with 'could', or 'I want to'.
- Noticing how the different word changes our understanding and how you feel.

Let's agree that perfection is a fallacy and work together on the path of continual improvement.



I am not Being Mean—Robert Made me do It

The purpose of Roberts Rules of Order is to provide guidelines to ensure everyone has a fair and equal chance to express their opinions, everyone is treated with respect and groups can gain a consensus while respecting the right of minority opinions. A Parliamentarian serves as a referee when there are questions as to the Rules.

One basic concept that is needed for a group to function is to radically accept nothing will ever be perfect. Sometimes we get what we want, sometimes we don't and the needs of the group require members to support or at the very least acquiesce to the will of the majority.

From what I have observed we all know and use the basics. Problems arise when we get beyond the basics and can't see the forest for the trees. Each month there will be an article in the Key addressing some aspect of Roberts Rules.

There are different rules depending on whether or not the discussion/debate is connected to a motion on the floor.

Debates take place after a motion has been proposed and seconded.

When there is a report without a motion, the presenter is given the courtesy of completing their report without interruption.

Upon completion, the Chair may recognize members to ask questions and then thank the presenter and move on. No motion means no action, means no debate.

Changes can be made to establish/modify debates to make them more productive.

Call for the Order of the Day -When a discussion is not about something on the agenda or is done at the wrong time. The Chair clarifies. There is no debate or amends. It must be automatically obeyed. You can interrupt the speaker.

Point of Order - Is an assertion that a rule is being violated. The person using this tool states the rule that is being violated. It is decided by the Chair. You can interrupt the speaker.

Call for the Question -This is used to end the debate and requests a vote be taken. Needs a second. No debate or amends and adopted with a 2/3 vote. You must be recognized to speak.

Object to Considering the Question -This is a statement that the topic under discussion should not be happening. No second. No debate or amends and adopted with a 2/3 vote. This is about a motion that is on the floor. You can interrupt the speaker.

Point of Privilege -Addresses noise, social talk, disrespect or other issues that are interfering with the meeting. Decided by the Chair. No second, no debate no amends. You can interrupt the speaker. Table the Matter -Suspend further consideration of something. Needs a second. No debate or amends and needs a 2/3 vote. You must be recognized to speak. We are all here for the common purpose of helping those in need within our community. Our ability to focus on that purpose is the goal of Roberts Rules.



What can clubs do as a WHRC Project? Why not put the suffrage story in school libraries in your town? Build on the momentum of the suffrage centennial and make sure women's history is in schools and public libraries.

Winning the Vote: The triumph of the American Woman Suffrage Movement by Robert Cooney, Jr. is an enjoyable book for students doing research and learning about our history. There are hundreds of images and dozens of profiles which will capture the imagination of all who read it. It is a 496-page oversize edition that you can purchase for \$30 if you order four or more. One copy is \$49.95.

There are stories about Lucretia Mott, Frederick Douglass, Carrie-Chapman Catt, Ida B. Wells-Barnett, James Brady, and Alice Paul. The book also contains over 960 historic photographs and original source documents. The clothbound book with gold stamped dust jacket and gold silk bookmark can be purchased at the National Women's History Alliance web store at NWHA1980.org. It is a 496-page oversize edition that you can purchase for \$30 if you order four or more. One copy is \$49.95.

To make your project more exciting, why not invite your local librarian, School Superintendent, School librarian or a teacher to one of your luncheons and present the book to them for their library as a token of your appreciation for all they have done during these past "very trying" years. You might also consider making bookmarks celebrating the Right To Vote for your local library or schools.





The National Women's History Alliance (NWHA) says: Women in the United States did not win the right to vote until 1920 with passage of the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution. "Winning the Vote: The Triumph of the American Woman Suffrage Movement" by Robert P. J. Cooney, Jr., tell the story as no other book has. It captures the


color, passion, and excitement of this important part of American history. This beautifully designed hardback presents the suffrage movement clearly and chronologically, with emphasis on the remarkable personalities and turbulent political campaigns of the early 20th century. The book uses over 960 photographs, posters, leaflets, and portraits to illustrate this fascinating account of the expansion of American democracy. Large format images and a fast-paced text highlight key developments between 1848 and 1920, including over 50 state electoral campaigns and the final, controversial, and hard-fought drive for the 19th Amendment.

"Winning the Vote" shows how women have long been active participants in U.S. history, and how many became politically powerful <u>before</u> winning the vote. The book includes illustrated profiles of 78 American women and men, black and white, who led the drive for equal rights, and an unprecedented display of the symbolism, color, and imagery used by the increasingly sophisticated suffrage movement. The opening three chapters, out of eighteen, cover efforts for full democracy in the 19th century, and an Epilogue follows suffragists into government and other influential areas after 1920.

"While bits and pieces of women's history have been scattered and forgotten over time, "Winning the Vote" weaves stories from around the country into a rich and exciting new tapestry.
