In the end we discovered that City Council members, County Supervisors, Legislators and CEO's are people just like we are and ready to help!

1. Authors must be amateur; earnings from writing not to exceed \$500 annually. Entries may not have been published prior to competition and must be original works.

** Entries must be typed and double-spaced to be considered for State contest**

Please use minimum margins of (1) inch, using $8\frac{1}{2}x11$ -inch white paper, one side only.

2. Entries must be written during the Contest Year, Jan. – Dec. 2021.

3. Word limit for Prose is 2,000 words.

4. Poetry minimum length of (8) lines and maximum of (30) lines.

5. TOP RIGHT CORNER *Place Author's Name, Address, Telephone number, Email,

Name of Club, District Or School, Grade, Address, Parent or Teacher's Email address.

6. Title of Entry, Number of words (prose) or Number of lines (poetry)

7. Submit four (4) copies BY MAIL OR ONE COPY BY EMAIL of Entry AND Creative Writing Release AND Parent/Minor Publicity Release (if applicable) To: Creative Writing Chairperson, Laura Schano; on or before January 20, 2022.

8. One First Place winner in Each Category will be sent to CFWC for further competition. Categories for Club Member Competition

(Club size is not a consideration)

1. PROSE: Short Story, Essay, Memoir, Inspirational, Skit/Play, or Children's Story

2. POETRY: Haiku, Whimsical, Limerick, Inspirational, or Poetry for Children Categories for Student Competition

Each student may enter no more than one (1) short story and one (1) poem for competition. The grade divisions are set forth by CFWC and judging is done accordingly.

Category 1 – Grades K, 1, 2

Category 2 – Grades 3, 4, 5

Category 3 – Grades 6, 7, 8

Category 4 – Grades 9, 10, 11, 12

"Education in California—a Crisis—an Uncertainty"

Due to the continuing covid-19 pandemic and the resultant uncertainties, education in California is undergoing a true crisis. Most public and private universities are opening on an in- person basis—the instructors and students are to meet in the classroom face-to-face (masks in place.) The same is true for most public k-12 school districts. Yet, most community colleges will now offer their classes online. Nobody can predict the future.

Many K-12 school districts are even offering parents a choice: to send their children to school or opting out for online/distance learning. Classrooms are being specially prepared: plastic barriers are in place between desks; special air cleaning machines have been installed, special drinking fountains allowing for children to refill their plastic water bottles, decontamination of desks and classrooms prior to the opening of the class day and at its closing, and...more. Students and all school staff will be required to wear masks and will be tested on a regular basis.

It is projected that due to the length of the schools' shutdowns, many of California's students have experienced a serious learning loss and they and their families have suffered serious emotional distress.

As for the libraries in Los Angeles County, many are now open again on a limited basis. Some are offering curb service. You can order a book online and retrieve it at the library—it will be brought out to you. If you have a library card, you can enroll in Kanopy (to receive for free a host of videos online directly to you.) If you do not have a library card or have lost yours, you can secure a library card for FREE. A special offering this summer in many libraries was a free lunch to children under the age of 18. These lunches were provided four days per week and often included a paper bag with a learning kit. Kudos to our public libraries!!!!!!

Let us all pray that this awful nightmarish pandemic will soon be over for the good of our students and our communities. Keep safe.

A Book Review: Kindred Souls

How well do you know First Lady Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt?

I am an avid "reader". Every day as I walk throughout my neighborhood I listen to books on my Kindle. Whether an autobiography, biography, historical fiction, true crime, etc., I never go a day without "reading". I put "reading" in quotes because I am listening to a narrator read the books to me as I walk.


Recently, I have been studying the life and times of Eleanor Roosevelt, former first lady to President Franklin Roosevelt. What amazed me was how much I did not know about her, even though I count her among my favorite heroines. For those of you not that familiar with her, Eleanor Roosevelt was born in New York City on October 11, 1884. Her first name was actually Anna, not Eleanor. She had a tragic childhood losing both her mother and father at an early age. She was educated by private tutors until the age of 15, when she was sent to Allenswood, a school for girls in England. The headmistress, Mademoiselle Marie Souvestre, took a special interest in Eleanor and had a great influence on her education and thinking. At age 18, Eleanor returned to New York and on March 17, 1905, she married her fifth cousin, Franklin Delano Roosevelt, and between 1906 and 1916, they became the parents of six children.

Upon moving to the White House in 1933 when Franklin Roosevelt was elected President, Eleanor showed herself to be an extraordinary First Lady. After President Roosevelt's death on April 12, 1945, she continued in her public life. President Truman appointed her to the United Nations General Assembly. She served as chair of the Human Rights Commission and worked tirelessly to draft the Universal Declaration of Human Rights which was adopted by the General Assembly on December 10, 1948.

But did you know? There was a different side to Mrs. Roosevelt. It is detailed in the book, Kindred Souls, written by Edna Gurewitsch, the wife of Mrs. Roosevelt's personal physician, Dr. David Gurewitsch. Dr. Gurewitsch served as Eleanor's physician during the last fifteen years of her life.

The book details both the diaries David kept and the hundreds of "loving" letters he and Eleanor exchanged over the years of their incredible relationship. If you enjoy reading love stories, travelling the world, learning about the science, politics, and culture of the 1950's, you will find, like me, you cannot put the book down. In one section of the book their relationship was described as a "passionate" one on Eleanor's side and an "intimate" one on David's side. From her first encounter with David, Eleanor's relationship blossomed into a unique and platonic love that also included David's wife Edna. Have some Kleenex ready when you get near the end of the book.

I purchased my copy at Amazon Smile in the audible format. It was on the "free" list. I was excited to immediately download it and start listening. I walked for miles because I could not put it down. You can also purchase it in other formats.



Next month, I'll share another book wir another fascinating story about Eleanor close friend Hick. This too will be y living in The White House and the

friendship that developed between Eleanor and an API reporter.

For those of you who don't know, Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt was a General Federation of Women's Clubs member. Her participation at her club is mentioned (vaguely) in both books.
