4. Open Discussion – Announcements, allowable time for sharing.

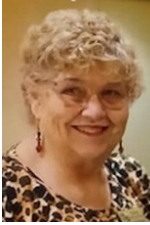

Sometimes we only Think we Know- Some Myths

Sometimes we think we know and it turns out to be not so true. Especially, when the group/meeting is running smoothly and then all of a sudden life slaps us in the face. Some of those misconceptions regarding what Robert had in mind are:

1. The presiding officer can only vote to break a tie.
 - A tie vote is decisive. It means the motion did not pass. The Chair can vote in support of the motion and it passes. The Chair is NOT required to vote.
 - Let's say the vote is 5 to 4 in favor of the motion, the Chair can vote to oppose and the motion fails. The Chair is NOT required to vote.

- In a 2/3 voting requirement where one vote can determine passage/failure the Chair can cast their vote and decide the outcome. The Chair is NOT required to vote.
- The Chair can vote in a ballot vote. If there is a tie, the Chair cannot vote a second time and the motion does not pass.

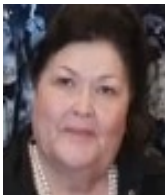
2. The Parliamentarian makes all the rulings

- The Chair is in control and is the person responsible for all rulings on matters of procedure.
- The Parliamentarian's role is to advise.

3. A motion without a second is void

- The purpose of a second is to ensure more than one person supports the idea.
 - That means when a Committee or Board make a motion it does not need a second.
 - That means if a motion is made, a second is forgotten, members debate/discuss and vote or pass the motion by unanimous consent it is presumed to have a second because members acted on it.

Sometimes we know the rule and sometimes we don't. It is much better to stop and check the details in the official rule book then get into a war. The purpose of all of these tools meant to ensure members have an equal opportunity to express their opinion and that decisions can be made in a timely fashion. Remember, rules and procedures only work when you use them. All members share the responsibility of using Roberts Rules to help the Club accomplish its purpose – helping our communities.

 2. Entries must be written during the Contest Year, Jan. – Dec. 2022.
 3. Word limit for Prose is 2,000 words.
 4. Poetry minimum length of (8) lines and maximum of (30) lines.
 5. TOP RIGHT CORNER *Place Author's Name, Address, Telephone number, Email, Name of Club, District Or School, Grade, Address, Parent or Teacher's Email address.
 6. Title of Entry, Number of words (prose) or Number of lines (poetry)
 7. Submit four (4) copies BY MAIL OR ONE COPY BY EMAIL of Entry AND Creative Writing Release AND Parent/Minor Publicity Release (if applicable)
To: Creative Writing Chairperson, Laura Schano; on or before Feb. 20, 2023.
 8. One First Place winner in Each Category will be sent to CFWC for further competition.

1. PROSE: Short Story, Essay, Memoir, Inspirational, Skit/Play, or Children's Story
 2. POETRY: Haiku, Whimsical, Limerick, Inspirational, or Poetry for Children

October was Domestic Violence Awareness and Prevention Month. You might ask, what does that have to do with women's history. At the last SGVD Meeting in October the history moment was about Astronaut Nicole Mann - First Native American Woman in Space. Mann was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant in the United States Marine Corps in 1999. She has accumulated more than 2,500 flight hours in 25 types of aircraft, 200 carrier arrestments and 47 combat missions in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Women in the military are targets of gender bias in the workplace, sexual, emotional, psychological, and physical abuse. Nicole is a "firstie" as the first Native American Astronaut and we do not know if she was ever targeted, but, based on my knowledge of domestic and workplace violence, she easily could have been.

Now what does this have to do with women's clubs. Most of you know that I am now a caregiver for my husband Randy. My long-time friend April Mae is here helping me. April Mae joined the Navy in August of 1992. She served six years with an honorable discharge and today is receiving a 100 per cent disability from the Veteran's Association.

Like Nicole, April Mae was a pioneer female serving as one of the first females on an Air Craft Carrier (1 of 45 women with 3,500 men.) Prior to being on the ship she was stationed at Miramar Naval Air Station. Here she was raped by her Leading Petty Officer (E-6) that entered her room while she was sleeping. She woke up and he was on top of her, but she tried to fight back. He overpowered her. She never reported the incident because her status was that of an E-2 and she knew that she would be retaliated against. This knowledge was based on her experience being in the military.

Then from 1996 – 1998 April Mae was stationed on the USS Boxer as a Police Officer. Here she was assaulted by the Master Chief Master-At-Arms E-9 on two occasions. On two different occasions he pushed her against the wall and forcibly kissed her against her will. When she told him it was not going to happen again there were severe repercussions. Eventually the case was reported. The Command's response was "you stay on the ship with him or, get out." April Mae chose to leave her life's dream of serving her country. She loved her job.

Today, April Mae suffers from Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) resulting in being hyper-vigilant awareness, anger outbursts controlled by medication, and suicidal ideation, all which

resulted in Cognitive Processing Therapy. Today, April Mae uses her experience to help other people.

Did You Know? An internal survey obtained by the military news source, Task & Purpose, reported that women who have served or are currently serving in the armed services have reported having issues with incorrect fitting equipment, pressure to return from parental leave, and gender bias in the workplace. 29% said sexual harassment was a major challenge. On February 21, 1996, the National Domestic Violence Hotline answered its very first call. In the past 25 years, they have worked tirelessly to shift power back to those affected by relationship abuse. They have answered more than 5.8 million calls, chats and texts from survivors and loved ones.

Women in history traditionally have faced adversity. Remember that 1 in 4 of your friends seated at your table have experienced some form of violence. And that is why Domestic Violence found its way into this Women's History Article via the *Key*.
